## Five Oaks House Report

Work on replacement of the flat roof around the skylight has been delayed. Temporary repairs are planned until the permanent work can be scheduled, hopefully this fall. Work is also planned on the built-in gutter around the tower roof. During the past winter, several other roof related problems arose. After heavy snow, ice dams formed in two locations, resulting in water infiltration into the house. One area was above the west facing window in the second-floor rear hallway. The other was above the large window at the top of the main staircase. This is as a result of the original design of the roof above this area and has probably happened before. We would like to find a way to correct this problem, but as is often the case, there is no simple solution. Another problem was the formation of ice on the outside elevator door. We hope that this will be less complicated to correct.

Plaster restoration in the second and third floor rooms is currently in the planning stages, to be followed by the painting of these areas. There are at least ten rooms that will need plaster related repair work.

## Moment in History – A Modern Marvel

Five Oaks featured modern technology at the time of its completion in 1894. The rooms were lit throughout with electricity, and some of the light fixtures also used gas for illumination.

Although there are ten fireplaces, the house was heated with a coal fired boiler. This steam heating system is still in use today, although a newer gas fired boiler is currently in use. Radiators on the first floor were concealed, some under window seats, and some below grilles in the floor. These also were designed to mix fresh

air from a vent in the basement.

At a time when the majority of the homes in the country did not yet have indoor plumbing, Five Oaks had multiple bathrooms. Even the servants had their own bathroom, although the tub and sink were on the third floor, and



the servants' toilet was one floor below. This was probably due to the low ceiling in the third-floor bathroom, which



was too low to allow the height needed for the toilet tank. The servants' wooden toilet tank is the only original tank that has survived in place. Two bathrooms on the second floor featured massive bathtubs with showers. The master bathroom still has the shower equipment in

place today. Built into the floor below the plumbing fixtures is a marble slab with a secondary drain, to direct leaks to the basement. These were sold by the manufacturer of the plumbing fixtures, probably the J.L. Mott Iron Works of New York and Chicago. In the basement laundry room are three brown glazed wash tubs, stamped Motts "Yorkshire".

Few homes, even today, are equipped with an elevator, but one was in place when the home was completed. The original Five Oaks elevator has not operated in decades, but it has survived. The shaft has been turned into closet space on the first and second floor. The passenger cab, actually a platform open on three sides, is at the bottom of the shaft in the basement. In a space off the third-floor servants' bath, next to the shaft, is a 6-foot-long water tank which was part of the operating system. Above, in the attic, are heavy gears, pulleys, and a large braking mechanism. While the old elevator and some of the other fixtures in the house are no longer in use, it is fortunate that they have survived for nearly 130 years, allowing visitors today and in the future an opportunity to see examples of the technology of 1894.

# Moment in History ~ Correction

We have a correction and additional information regarding the July 2021 newsletter article "Charles F. Schweinfurth in Massillon". It appears that Charles Schweinfurth was not the architect for the Mary McLain Russell Nurses Home as stated. Schweinfurth was the architect for the Massillon City Hospital, but the architect for the Russell Nurses home was Edmund Herrmann, who had been employed by Schweinfurth as the

superintendent of the Hospital project. Herrmann then went into practice as an architect in the Canton ~ Massillon area after the Hospital was completed. His home (no longer standing) was on the NW corner of Amherst Rd and Ohio Ave.

### MEMBERSHIPS/DONATIONS

The Foundation has three financial accounts, two checking accounts and an investment account. One checking account is for general expenses, repairs, printing, postage, fees, etc. This account is funded with the membership income. The second checking account is used for restoration and preservation projects. This account is funded by donations, capital campaigns and grants. The third account is an investment account held by the Stark Community Foundation. Any memorials received are deposited in this account and the account's principle is not used. As the principle grows, it will help us to eventually become self-sustained. You can also donate a memorial directly to the Massillon Heritage Foundation investment account through the Stark Community Foundation. If you currently have a personal account with SCF, it is a simple funds transfer, or anyone can mail in a donation to SCF. SCF will notify us of the donation.
